a substantive interest or experience in health disparities. Topics include:

- understanding racial/ethnic differences
- racism and health outcomes
- race/class and social determinants of health disparities
- key distinctions across racial/ ethnic groups
- the role of SES measures in studying race/ethnicity
- diverse mechanisms and competing explanations
- conceptualizing different health outcomes
- concept of health disparities, measurement, and policy implications


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- understanding of resources and effective interventions to address disparities
